CALS Message: Supporting our future

As the new year approaches, I have our future students on my mind.

Today one of our core values is at stake – something that should concern all of us who are committed to the future of our college, UW–Madison and Wisconsin. I am talking about declining state support for postsecondary education and its devastating effect on our young people and their opportunities.

Undergraduate education at UW–Madison is paid for by a combination of general program revenue (GPR) – derived from state taxes – and tuition, paid by students and families. In 2001, GPR funding for UW–Madison was \$370 million and tuition revenue was \$277 million. Ten years later, GPR has fallen to just \$279 million, while tuition revenue increased to \$400 million (all figures adjusted to 2010 dollars). As a result tuition increased from \$ 5,044 per year in 2001 (2010 dollars) to \$8,987 in 2010. (These numbers do not include the \$47.5 million cut imposed in the 2011 budget.) The state also gives UW money for special purposes, but these funds cannot be used directly in providing undergraduate education.

When the state fails to support the university, the university gets the needed revenue by charging students and their families more. This is a pretty straightforward relationship, but I am not sure that the implications are always clear. When the state cuts the budget and tuition increases, fewer students from middle-class and financially pressed families can afford to attend UW–Madison.

Here at CALS, we are especially aware of the effects

the Ambassador Program, CALS Leadership Retreat and Outstanding Advisor awards. Various giving opportunities are available and your tax-deductible donation will impact the future of our current CALS students.

on Wisconsin's rural families. Rural per capita income is 20 percent less than in metropolitan areas, and 40 percent of CALS students demonstrate significant financial need. What is the future for CALS if a greater proportion of kids interested in careers in agriculture and natural resources cannot afford to come to Madison? Indeed, what is the future of Wisconsin's rural communities?

We also can't pretend that the quality of undergraduate education won't suffer. Less revenue means fewer degree programs, especially in production agriculture, and fewer courses dedicated to agriculture. The time it takes to finish a degree will lengthen. And it will be harder for people with moderate incomes to afford to come here.

Supporting our agricultural communities means supporting public higher education in Wisconsin. The UW System is the provider of affordable, accessible opportunities to earn bachelor's degrees, and we at CALS are the provider of the specialized knowledge needed to excel in careers in agriculture, natural resources and the life sciences. When state cuts make it harder for rural kids to attend CALS, the economic vitality of our rural communities is diminished.

How we fund a college education at UW is up to the people of Wisconsin – and in any policy debate it's important to have all facts on the table. My hope is that, as we move forward, undergraduate education gets the attention and resources that our young people and our state deserve.

New UW-Madison CALS dean named

Kathryn VandenBosch, professor of plant biology at the University of Minnesota in St. Paul, has been selected as the new dean of the College of Agricultural and Life Sciences (CALs) at UW-Madison.

"We are delighted that Professor VandenBosch will be joining us. She brings a wealth of experience, accomplishments, and leadership acquired at public land grant institutions not dissimilar from Wisconsin. Her very articulate and insightful approach will be most effective in the diverse components of CALs and Wisconsin's agricultural community," says Provost Paul M. DeLuca Jr.

VandenBosch has headed the plant biology department at the University of Minnesota since 2001, with a brief hiatus in 2006 to serve as interim dean of the newly formed College of Food, Agricultural and Natural Resource Sciences. She is also a member and former chair of the executive committees of both the Faculty Senate and the University Senate.

"I am really honored by my selection and very appreciative of how welcoming everyone has been. I'm looking forward to getting to know people better and becoming a part of the CALs community," VandenBosch says.

Her research focuses on the genetics of plant-microbe interactions and nitrogen fixation in legumes, a family that includes several agriculturally important species, and in 2009 was named a fellow of the American Society of Plant Biologists.

Prior to her tenure at the University of Minnesota, VandenBosch was a faculty member at Texas A&M University for 12 years. She holds masters and doctorate degrees in botany from the University of Massachusetts Amherst, and spent time at both UW-Madison and the John Innes Institute in Great Britain as a postdoctoral associate.

"I think of myself as an alumna even though I don't have a degree from Wisconsin. I've always had a fondness for the place and a great respect for the research conducted there," she says. "There are few places I



would want to be. Wisconsin has a land grant mission in concert with strong basic science and a strong liberal arts university."

A 16-member search-and-screen committee composed of faculty, staff, students, and current and former members of the CALs board of visitors recommended a short list of three finalists to the chancellor and the provost from which they made their selection.

VandenBosch will assume her new role on March 1, 2012, and will receive a salary of \$250,000. Interim Dean William F. Tracy, who has held the position since Jan. 2, will return to his roles as professor and chair of the Department of Agronomy.

"Dean Tracy has provided excellent guidance and leadership for CALs. We would like to extend our thanks for his tireless work throughout his appointment and in the months to come," says DeLuca.

Established in 1889, CALs enrolls approximately 2,600 undergraduate and 1,000 graduate students and carries out UW-Madison's mission as a public land-grant university. The dean is the chief academic and executive
