

DEAN'S MESSAGE

The Wisconsin Idea and Wisconsin Dairy

As I write this, I have just returned from the summer WALSAA picnic, which was held at Pagel's Ponderosa Dairy in Kewaunee, Wis. Through new acquaintances and updates from old friends, I am reminded how our alumni are successful innovators in so many fields, including dairy, and such innovators are definitely in demand because Wisconsin's dairy industry faces its fair share of challenges each and every year. The spring of 2017, in particular, presented a unique situation.

Changes in Canada's dairy policy halted U.S. sales of ultra-filtered milk, a product that lowers transportation and storage costs and makes cheese manufacturing more efficient. As a result, some processors reduced their demand for milk. This happened at a time when domestic cheesemakers had large inventories and were unable to pick up the excess milk, leaving dozens of Wisconsin dairy farmers without a place to ship and sell their product.

The spring crisis was just one of many reasons the University of Wisconsin System chose to focus its inaugural Wisconsin Idea Summit on the state's dairy industry. The Dairy Summit -- held so aptly in the heart of June, National Dairy Month -- brought together industry leaders, legislators, government officials, and globally recognized UW researchers. Their task was to identify the top priorities to help the dairy industry move towards a prosperous future and keep Wisconsin known as America's Dairyland. More than 200 people attended the one-day public event, which consisted of panel discussions and question-and-answer sessions. CALS took a lead role in organizing the program, and we were well-represented among the presenters.

One of the most enlightening parts of this summit was hearing members of the dairy sector describe how the industry's current trends and challenges have affected their businesses. The list is long. Some of the trends and challenges were demographic shifts in demand for new types of dairy products, environmental impacts (and public perception) of agriculture, the role of low product prices in prolonging debt, and the affordability of new farming technology. These issues are only further complicated by sudden changes, like what we saw with Canada.

Fortunately, for the dozens of dairy farmers affected this spring, the crisis was solved temporarily with new

contracts and business arrangements between dairy farms and milk buyers. But long-term challenges still exist --- and opportunities, if we are ready to seize them --- that leave a lot on the collective plate for the state's industry and its partners in the university and government. Thankfully, Wisconsin has a strong tradition of taking on challenges through thoughtful and collaborative work.

Over the decades, CALS and UW-Extension continue to partner with our state's producers, processors, and government officials to devise solutions that ensure the success of the dairy industry. True to the Wisconsin Idea, UW's innovations have made a major impact in this regard. For example, the Center for Dairy Research has worked with the state's dairy processors to develop new products in response to consumer demands, like specialty cheeses. In addition, the Center for Dairy Profitability has developed a new bilingual human resource management program to help dairy farmers adapt to expanding herd sizes and the resulting changes in herd management. UW dairy scientists' discoveries have also helped solve problems related to cow nutrition and health, reproductive success, milk quality, nutrient management and more. The influence of CALS on the dairy industry and beyond is also felt through the students we train, who become innovators and leaders in their fields and continue to work with us long after they have left campus.

This innovation needs to continue to keep the Wisconsin dairy industry at the forefront of the agriculture world. Here at CALS, we are committed to working with our partners—and looking for ways to expand those partnerships— to address critical industry challenges today and into the future. This is living the "Wisconsin Idea" and a major reason for why we are here.

HERRMAN TO RECEIVE WALSAA DALUGE RED JACKET AWARD AT FIRE-UP

A recently established Wisconsin Agricultural and Life Sciences Alumni Association (WALSAA) tradition will continue at the WALSAA Football Fire-Up event on September 9 as the second WALSAA Daluge Red Jacket Award will be presented to Al Herrman.

Herrman was selected because of his longtime involvement and support of WALSAA. Over the years, Herrman has served WALSAA as a student representative, Farm & Industry Short Course (FISC) representative and as a member of the WALSAA Board of Directors for three terms. He also served two terms as WALSAA President. in 1981 and 1985. Currently, Herrman is the chair of the Dean Henry Residence Fund committee, co-chair of the WALSAA events committee, and a member of the FISC. finance and marketing and development committees. "Al Herrman embodies the essence of the WALSAA Daluge Red Jacket Award. His energy and commitment to WALSAA and his support of the students and faculty at the UW-Madison College of Agriculture and Life Sciences (CALS) is truly humbling," shared Vern Dougherty, WALSAA President.

"The reason for WALSAA to exist has not changed in its 40-plus years of existence," Herrman said. "WALSAA is here to support CALS, serve as a way to support students with scholarships and keep alumni involved with CALS and the University." Herrman encourages more alumni to give back to their departments and to CALS. "Don't be afraid to step up. It's easy to do."

Herrman recently retired from Wisconsin Public Service as manager of Wholesale Services. He grew up on a dairy farm in Sparta, Wis. and is a 1974 FISC graduate, received his BS in Dairy Science in 1977 and a Masters in Business Science. Herrman has also worked as a loan officer for Production Credit Association and held positions at the Wisconsin Department of Agriculture as International Trade Specialist and Director of Marketing and Economic Analysis. He and his wife, Lynn, live in New Franken, Wis. and have two children and three grandchildren.

The WALSAA Daluge Red Jacket Award honors Rick and Peggy Daluge. Rick was WALSAA's Executive Director for many years and a founding member of the National Agricultural Alumni and Development Association (NAADA). Rick served as CALS Placement Director and CALS Assistant Dean before retiring as FISC Director in 2008. A red jacket is presented in their honor to someone who has made a significant contribution to WALSAA and the future of the organization.

The member cost for a combined package ticket to both the Fire-Up luncheon and game is free for kids under 2 (if sitting on a lap at game); \$45 for children 3 to 5; \$55 for children 6 to 18; and \$75 for adults (while tickets last).

Tickets can be ordered at WALSAA.org and must be ordered by Friday, September 1 to receive the advance pricing. After that date, Fire-Up tickets will be sold at the gate for an additional \$5 each. All tickets are held at the event registration desk and picked up upon arrival at the Fire-Up; they are not mailed.
