Dean's Message: Attracting – and keeping – the best

CALS Dean & Director Kate VandenBosch



I often ask our graduating students, "Of all the experiences you've had at CALS, which stand out as the most important?"

Almost invariably, students will talk about the professors who have changed their lives. They describe how a particular faculty member opened their eyes and opened doors, igniting their interest in a field of study and helping them envision their future path.

Indeed, faculty are the lifeblood of the university. They fuel the intellectual engine of our college as they teach, mentor and make discoveries across campus and around the world, bringing in more than \$100 million in research grants each year.

It is essential to our long-term success that we continue to recruit and retain top-notch faculty. One of the best ways to do this – and one of the best tools in our arsenal as we compete with other universities – is through private support for professorships and chairs. Private support will allow us to maintain our tradition of faculty excellence into the future – and also help us use state funds more efficiently.

Two examples at CALS help illustrate the value of private support, as well as the different models for providing it. One is the Allen Professorship in Plant Pathology, supported by an endowment from former faculty members Ethel K. and Oscar N. Allen. The Department of Plant Pathology selected one of their own outstanding faculty members, Caitilyn Allen (no relation), for the honor, which served not only to recognize Allen, but also freed up enough salary

support for the department to pursue hiring an additional faculty member.

Another example is offered by the Wisconsin Potato and Vegetable Growers Association (WPVGA), a long-time and valued partner of CALS in many endeavors. The WPVGA, in agreement with CALS faculty and leadership, recognized the need for a faculty member with special expertise in applying statistical genetics to potato breeding – knowledge that will serve to strengthen their industry. A gift of \$370,000 over the course of five years made the hire possible, establishing Jeff Endelman, a star researcher from Cornell, as the WPVGA professor of plant breeding.

We are close to establishing named professorships in genetics, food science and bacteriology within the next few years – and that's just the beginning. A \$100 million gift to the University of Wisconsin – Madison by donors John and Tashia Morgridge will provide a 1-to-1 match for any other donor who makes a gift to endow a professorship, a chair or a distinguished chair.

That tremendous gift could ultimately double the university's current number of endowed chairs and professorships – and CALS will certainly be part of that growth.

WALSAA remembers Tom Schomisch, former LSC professor and chair

Thomas P. Schomisch, age 70, passed away peacefully with his family by his side on Sunday, Jan. 4. Tom, the oldest of four children, was born to Sgt. Paul and Jeanette Tollefson Schomisch at Camp Grant, Rockford, Ill., on June 5, 1944, while his father served in the Army Medical Corp. He grew up on his family's dairy farm in Kiel, Wis., and graduated from St. Gregory High School, St. Nazianz, Wis., in 1962.

After earning a bachelor's degree in dairy science (1966) and master's degree in agricultural journalism (1967) from UW-Madison, he was named the first director of public relations for Lake to Lake Dairy Cooperative, Manitowoc. In 1974, he accepted a position with the UW Center of Cooperatives, UW-Extension on the UW-Madison campus where he developed education programs for cooperative directors, employees and managers. Upon completing a doctorate in mass communications in 1983, he also joined the faculty of the UW Agricultural Journalism Department. Professor Schomisch taught advertising, market research and marketing campaign courses. His colleagues elected him department chair in 1999. He retired in 2004.

He served as advisor for the National Agri-Marketing Association student chapter for 17 years. The NAMA chapter won the Outstanding Chapter award nine years

and was a finalist in the marketing plan competition six times. The College of Agricultural and Life Sciences recognized his work with students naming him Outstanding Student Advisor in 1996. Dr. Schomisch was named Outstanding National NAMA Advisor in 1997 and 2003.

He devoted his career to communication and cooperatives. He was elected as a member of the board of directors of Group Health Cooperative for 37 years and for Farm Credit Associations for 14 years. The Wisconsin Federation of Cooperatives awarded him their Cooperative Builder Award for lifetime service to cooperatives in 2005.

Beyond his work, Tom was an active member of Madison West Kiwanis and alumni director for Alpha Gamma Rho Fraternity. An avid golfer, Tom served on advisory boards for Hawks Landings and University Ridge golf courses.

He is survived by his wife of 48 years, Gail and daughters Kathleen (Michael) Jensen and Kristin (Christopher) Passaro; grandchildren; sisters; brother; and many nieces and nephews.
