CALS Message: New faculty on campus

CALS Senior Associate Dean Richard Straub



Faculty excellence is essential to making our college strong. Our faculty's research prowess, dedication to teaching and commitment to sharing its knowledge around Wisconsin and around the world help make CALS a global leader among institutions of higher education.

I'd like to introduce you to several new faculty members. I hope you have opportunities to meet them in person over the coming years.



Craig Johnston

Craig Johnston joined the faculty in the Department of Forest and Wildlife Ecology earlier this year. His research focuses on forest management and its potential for mitigating climate change. "Governments around the world are quick to adopt legislation that rely on forests as an answer to climate change, yet little is known about the true cost of these policies," Johnston says. "My goal is to better understand how we can maximize the carbon sequestration potential of forests while also improving the economic viability of the forest products industry. With this in mind, my research group works on issues in forest management, international trade and bioenergy systems."

Johnston received his doctorate degree in economics from the University of Victoria in Canada, where he examined how climate change mitigating policies affect global forestry markets. During that time, he also worked with the Industry, Trade and Economics Research Group at the Canadian Forest Service on regional and national forestry issues.

Brad Bolling, BS'02, PhD'07, joined the Department of Food Science faculty last July. In his research he seeks to understand how foods prevent chronic disease. "Our focus has been on how yogurt, berries and nuts act in the gut to inhibit chronic inflammation associated with obesity, colitis and cardiovascular disease," he says.

"We are also actively working to better characterize plant polyphenol composition and their metabolism after consumption, as these may be responsible for the health benefits of certain foods. Our latest work in this area has been with aronia berries and almonds."

Bolling did his undergraduate and graduate work at CALS, but he was a postdoctoral fellow at Tufts University and an assistant professor in nutritional sciences at the University of Connecticut.

Kristin Thorleifsdottir came to UW–Madison last summer with a joint appointment in the CALS Department of Landscape Architecture and the Department of Design Studies in the School of Human Ecology. Thorleifsdottir, who was born and raised in Reykjavik,

Iceland, looks at behavioral impacts of planning and design.

"My primary area of interest lies within the area of environment and behavior studies (EBS), in particular issues regarding aspects of daily life in urban environments and the influence environmental design and urban planning have on a population's behavioral patterns, attitudes, use, function, health and wellbeing," she says.

She holds a doctorate degree in community and environmental design from North Carolina State University. She was an assistant professor at the Agricultural University of Iceland and also taught at the Iceland Academy of the Arts. She has worked as a registered landscape architect in Iceland.

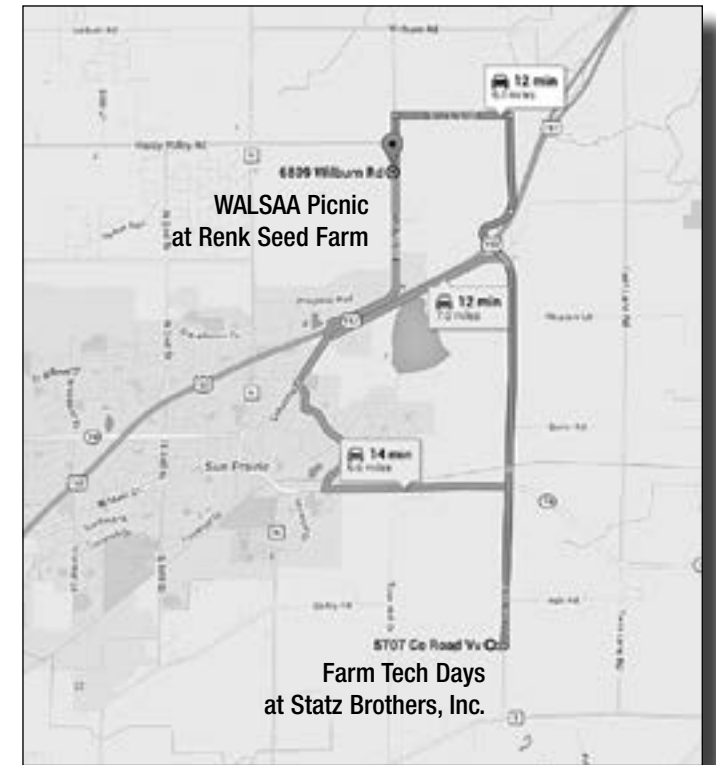

Member profile: Past Outstanding Sophomore Louann Hausner

Louann Hausner hailed from Spring Green, Wis., before attending UW–Madison where she majored in agricultural journalism and agricultural and applied economics. Hausner was a recipient of the Outstanding Sophomore Award and Outstanding Senior Aggie. She received her bachelor's degree in 1999. Read on to learn more about Hausner.

What is your current occupation?

I am a division customer support manager at John Deere. I'm very proud to say that I've worked for John Deere Company my entire professional career. Through these 16 years working for Deere, I have had the opportunity to live in five states and had responsibilities spanning six continents. I have worked with John Deere agriculture, construction, turf and forestry products, working to strengthen the Deere dealer channel and being an advocate for customer needs within product development at factories on three continents. Just this year, I accepted a position in Deere that has enabled me to relocate to Annapolis, Maryland, managing a team on the East Coast.

Why did you choose to enroll in CALS?

CALS and UW-Madison were the best of both worlds for me. CALS provided small class sizes where you know your professors by first name, yet with all of the resources and opportunities of a top-ranked university.

What student clubs or activities did you participate in while on campus?

National Agri-Marketing Association (NAMA) because it provided a realistic, hands-on education of what it takes to work with a team to assemble and present a marketing plan. Professor Tom Schomisch, who skillfully guided NAMA all four of my years, put his heart and soul into generously passing along his knowledge and inspiring our teams to realize our true potential.

Due to the connection with collegiate & professional NAMA, I was able to connect with many agri-marketing professionals and gain numerous career insights. This

experience led me to become a member of professional NAMA after college, where I was a chapter president in Iowa.

The Association of Women in Agriculture (AWA) enabled me to connect and collaborate with other strong women that shared my passion for agriculture. Those women inspired me when I was starting out and continue to strengthen me on a personal and professional level today.

By representing the college as a CALS Ambassador, I was able to see the college from diverse perspectives, whether that was from the view of a nervous potential student or an anxious parent looking to help their child make an important decision. From those perspectives, I was able to better understand all that CALS had to offer and appreciate it while I was still there!

What advice would you give to incoming freshmen?

Take every advantage of job shadowing and internship opportunities in college. It's the most realistic way to "try on" a career and a company to see if it is a good fit for you. If you are interested in a specific career, shadow several people in that job because no two people do a job exactly the same.

Identify, articulate and embrace those attributes that make you unique. Those are your differentiators that will set you apart from the crowd in what you can bring to any team or business. Don't assume that everyone else enjoys or excels at the same things.

Be intentional about connecting with your college friends after you graduate. I am so thankful that six of my CALS friends and I have made a commitment to connect at least two times a year, since our graduation 16 years ago, because these connections are important to our lives. We took a trip to New York City for our 30th birthdays and ironically, ran into one of our ag journalism professors while we were at Rockefeller Center – small world! As life takes us in different directions and growing families bless our lives, it's challenging to schedule time for friends, but remember, you must put on your air mask

before assisting others! It is so important to foster those relationships that strengthen you, and in turn, continue to support those that have become your chosen family.

What one or two specific experiences did you have while a student that impacted your career?

When I was young, I dreamed of doing work that would allow me to travel the globe and work with different cultures. The summer of my sophomore year, I participated in a CALS international studies summer program to study agriculture marketing at a university in France. While there, I worked in a vineyard as a tour guide. I was delighted when local farmers that had learned that I was American had gone out of their way to ask me to come and see their "American John Deere tractors." That was the "ah-ha" moment for me, when I realized that I could follow my passion for international business, working with an admired company that had a strong global footprint. I came back from France, pursued an internship with Deere, and the rest is history!

Through NAMA, I had the opportunity to talk with people within John Deere while still in college that gave me the advice to learn the core of the business, first, and start my career working with the dealer channel. This advice drove me to pursue my first position in Deere in the Minneapolis branch as a territory aftermarket manager in North Dakota. That experience has been the core foundation of my career.

Why do you think students and alumni should connect to the college through an alumni group such as WALSAA?

CALS, whether current or future alumni. This organization can be an easy introduction point to key contacts, but also, an ongoing resource pool for ideas, support and potential opportunities.

What have you found to be most rewarding in your career or volunteer work?

The most rewarding part of volunteering for me is building relationships. I have had the privilege of volunteering on four medical mission trips to Haiti and two educational and agricultural mission trips to Western Africa. There is great challenge, and reward, in breaking through the language and cultural barriers by demonstrating your dedication with repeated visits and carrying through with agreed upon goals. I'm especially excited about the work I am doing in Haiti, because now, due to my church's continued work with the village of Jean Denis, we have built a strong relationship with the community, gained their trust, and now earned the right to take our support to the next level. Next, we will be working to grow economic stability in this village by supporting the local rice farmers through improving their irrigation infrastructure.

What is something you achieved in the last five years?

You are never too young, or old, to set audacious goals! A few years ago, I set a goal to run a race on all seven continents. After running races on the steep stairs of the Great Wall of China, the soft beaches of the Gold Coast of Australia, and the rocky ocean cliffs outside of Cape Town, South Africa, just to name a few places, I'm proud to say that with a cool, icy marathon I ran in Antarctica in 2013 I have achieved that goal.

WALSAA awards Outstanding Advisor

The winner of this year's WALSAA Outstanding Advisor Award is Robin Mittenthal with the Global Health Institute.

Mittenthal studied biology and Chinese at Carleton College in Minnesota before serving as an agricultural advisor with the Peace Corps in The Gambia, West Africa.

In the mid 1990s, Mittenthal returned to the U.S. and worked as a farmhand and manager on both conventional and organic farms in several states. He earned master's degrees in nutrition from Tufts University and library and information science from University of Illinois – Urbana-Champaign. He also completed most, but not all, of a doctorate in entomology at UW-Madison, exploring the impact of organic

fertilizers on both plants and their insect pests.

He has worked with K-12 students as both a librarian and a teacher and now enjoys helping college students think about local food production, the concept of sustainability and other food-related aspects of health.

Mittenthal has traveled in China, speaks rusty Mandarin and reads about Chinese environmental issues when not gardening or working to address disparities in access to food that exist in Madison. He is also now studying Spanish and advising groups attempting to provide social services to Wisconsin's large but mostly invisible population of Latino farm workers.

The award was presented in April at the College of Agricultural and Life Sciences Awards Program.
