# **CALS Message: A farewell to CALS and UWEX Administration**

fter a lot of discussion with my family, I've decided to step down from my administrative roles this summer to head back to my faculty home in Biological Systems Engineering. I've served as CALS' associate dean for extension and outreach since 2008. This job has been the most fast-moving and rewarding of my career.

As a member of faculty, I will develop research and extension programs that apply new technologies – including sensors, robotics and wireless communications - to reduce injuries and negative health outcomes for people and the environment. I'm thrilled to return to faculty life. I love recruiting and mentoring students and opening young minds to the excitement of applying engineering solutions to complex agricultural and environmental problems.

As we speak, Extension is going through the biggest change in its 100-plus-year history. The "nEXT Generation" reorganization efforts began in early 2015, and the process will continue through this year and result in change that impacts counties and UW campuses. I am hopeful that these efforts will lead to an organization that is more streamlined, efficient, modern and sustainable for the coming decades.

Looking back at my associate dean experience, it's amazing how many things happen in a world-class land-grant university like UW–Madison in a short time. In eight years, I've been able to work with five different deans, and I've loved solving complicated problems with wonderful colleagues in CALS and UWEX administration. The most rewarding role has been to align resources to respond to a rapidly changing world. I've been able to support departments, centers and regional extension leaders as we've hired about 30 campus specialists at UW–Madison and UW–River Falls, and more than 35 county educators and agents.

Wisconsin is a special place. When I was a candidate for this position in late 2007, then-Dean Molly Jahn invited me over from Minnesota to experience a Badger football game. While I'd been sold on the job itself, it was that sunny October afternoon in Camp Randall, and feeling the stadium sway during "Jump Around," that convinced our family that Madison was the place to be.

We're also a special state in that agriculture faces enormous challenges in the coming decade that CALS and Cooperative Extension must meet head-on. We will continue to see growing needs and critical challenges around water and other natural resources; competing sustainably in a global food and agricultural market; and appropriately and safely deploying new biological, genetic and digital technologies. The great people in our college are up to the task, and I am eager to engage with them wearing my creative faculty hat.

Best wishes to all the WALSAA members whom I've had the pleasure of meeting. I will still see you around, but it will be from a different seat – and, hopefully, with a glow on my face.


