# **CALS MESSAGE**

#### **Summer Buzzes with Learning**

You might think of summer as a relatively sleepy time on campus. But that image no longer holds true. The coming summer at CALS will be busier than ever, and we intend for that trend to keep growing.

Students will have the widest-ever array of courses to choose from—everything from foundational courses in microbiology, biochemistry and genetics to service and specialty courses such as Nutrition Today, Poultry Products Technology and—drawing our highest enrollment in summers past—a life sciences communication course called Visualizing Science and Technology. These and other classes come in addition to all manner of field and lab courses, independent study and research projects.

Last summer more than 1,300 students enrolled in one or more of the 86 courses CALS offered. Our goal is to grow those numbers by 10 percent this summer and every summer for the next five years. We plan to do this by increasing our online and interdisciplinary courses; continuing to work with such groups as international summer students and incoming freshmen; offering more scholarships and financial aid; and, most important, continuing to listen to and respond to student needs and wishes.

This effort at CALS is part of a larger push to enhance the summer term throughout UW–Madison, a program that saw its first implementation in summer 2016. Campus leaders saw a need for change after recognizing that

summer enrollments had been flat for a decade during a time when two trends emerged. First, student debt had continued to rise, drawing concern from parents, policymakers and students. Second, peer institutions had embraced innovative strategies to use the summer session as a way to extend the learning cycle, accelerate time to degree and reduce unnecessary student debt.

In strengthening our summer term, our goals are to enhance the student learning experience by providing students with more options and greater flexibility, along with the potential for shorter time to degree and reduced debt. Growing our summer term offerings also allows us to make use of our laboratories and classrooms year-round rather than letting these valuable facilities sit vacant over the summer term. At the same time, our ability to reach new, non-degree students helps build a new revenue stream, which may help offset other losses.

So, if it's been a while since you've visited the CALS campus, I urge you to drop by this summer. You'll see more students than ever working hard to achieve their goals while taking advantage of the summer pleasures our campus offers. Studying while taking in the sun and the views of Lake Mendota—perhaps while enjoying some Babcock ice cream!—is definitely allowed. Such scenes will affirm we're coming closer to our goal of having a busy year-round campus at CALS.
