We welcome that challenge. Those numbers mean that our programs are in high demand, and that these young adults care deeply about the disciplines and questions that have intrigued


Pete Kappelman

Smith has been a staff advisor for the program since 2003. During that time she has served thousands of students. Currently, she advises 592 students in the biology major through both CALS and Letters and Science.
