CALS Message: Help open doors for young people

recently had the chance to teach a new CALS freshman seminar class on the challenges of feeding a growing world population. Agriculture will need to produce twice as much as today due to more people, a growing appetite for animal-based protein and greater use of plant material for renewable energy. We need to do this in the face of water shortages, increasing frequency of extreme weather events and growing concerns at the interface between human and animal health.

In my Extension role, I see how these challenges present exciting opportunities for young people who want to "make a difference" as they enter the workforce. Cooperative Extension is working to grow our agricultural and food economy in Wisconsin through our faculty and staff on campus and out in communities. We lead applied research and educational programs that help sustain our natural resources. Connected to our global future is our proud history and ongoing support of 4-H and other youth education programs, including those connected to science, technology, engineering and math – the STEM disciplines that are so crucial to meeting present and future challenges.

But as I talk with my counterparts from land grant universities in the Midwest and the business and community leaders we serve, I am concerned about developing a talent pipeline that is big enough to meet those challenges. The talent needs are not just in Cooperative Extension. Last summer I travelled with a group of Extension leaders in the 12-state North Central region. We visited large multinational businesses connected with food production in North America and beyond. Prominent leaders told us of having career openings for well-paid, entry-level positions in labs and offices all over the country and having very small pools of candidates even willing to apply for positions. In Cooperative Extension, we attract great people, but we often have small pools of candidates for our jobs and sometimes have to go through two or three search processes to find the right individual.

As alumni, you are in a wonderful position to help us. And we need your help. The College has a growing

number of students; many are entering careers that connect directly to the big-picture challenges mentioned above. But too many enter the College unaware of the magnitude of opportunities and the degree to which science, communication skills and the social sciences will need to coalesce around these challenges. We need your help in recruiting the best and brightest to consider a career in fields connected to agriculture, food, environmental sciences, biology and related areas.

Please consider opening doors for students to experience the big-picture importance of your work. Field trips, facility visits, guest lectures and demos in K-12 and college classrooms can engage the interest of a young person. Internships can help students gain experience and point them in a specific direction that sparks their passion.

Back to my role in Extension. We, too, need great people. Our local presence is often the first connecting point to young people with a potential interest in agriculture and life sciences. If I can help you think about and tailor specific ways to target young people and engage them in the world's future, please let me know. On Wisconsin!
