## **CALS Message: The Hatch** match packs a punch

ome of the most important research projects on the CALS campus – and on land-grant campuses around the nation – start off with a relatively small federal– state matching fund program called Hatch.

The name refers to the Hatch Act (sponsor: Missouri Congressman William Hatch), which launched the program in 1887 with the mission of establishing an agricultural research network nationwide.

But the name may be considered a double entendre, given the fund's importance in incubating and "hatching" research that often develops into major studies supported by such agencies as the U.S. Department of Agriculture or the National Science Foundation.

Through Hatch, CALS receives \$5 to \$6 million dollars a year – funding that is matched one-to-one by the state, making it an excellent way to leverage both state and federal funding to benefit Wisconsin agriculture.

Every year at CALS we issue a call for competitive proposals. The proposals are evaluated by disciplinary experts, and then discussed and ranked by a faculty committee. We strive to provide Hatch funds to a wide range of projects, although at a relatively modest level. A typical Hatch allocation supports a graduate student as well as supply and travel expenses.

That may sound like small potatoes amid the \$100-\$110 million in research dollars that CALS brings in annually. But because Hatch funds can be used in ways that other funds can't, it's a very important source.

Here are the kinds of projects for which Hatch is a particularly needed source of funding:

Establishing new research areas – Hatch provides seed money that helps researchers gather the kind of basic data needed to apply for larger, more competitive grants. Example: My graduate student Mike Hillstrom (BS'03, PhD'09) and I examined how changes in climate were affecting plant resistance to insect pests. This line of research went on to get funding from the U.S. Department of Energy.

Supporting longer-term research - Faculty will often keep a line of research going for 10 or 20 years, continuing to improve and refine it as knowledge emerges. They can apply for Hatch funding throughout that research trajectory. Example: Hatch funding has allowed animal scientist Mark Cook to continue exploring the health benefits of conjugated linoleic acid (CLA), a fatty acid he's been examining for decades. Numerous patented products have emerged from this research.

Exploring novel areas – Hatch support allows faculty to explore new ideas that are not likely to get more competitive funding. Example: Entomologist Claudio Gratton explored how the distribution and diversity of biofuel crops and other land cover can improve pollinator activity, and potentially offset honeybee declines.

Applied approaches to statewide concerns – Federal funding is less likely to support applied research addressing statewide or local concerns. Example: Soil scientist Doug Soldat's Hatch project evaluated the performance of drought-resistant turfgrass species in Wisconsin using wastewater for irrigation - a point of particular concern in such water-pressed regions as the Central Sands.

Emergency funding for critical needs – It generally takes at least a year for federal funding to become available for a particular proposal. Hatch funding can come through much faster - and, if needed, states can pool some of it to collaboratively address a vital concern. Example: A number of Midwestern states recently did just that to study corn rootworm resistance to the Bt toxin in
