CALS Message: A home for budding scientists

the abundance of research opportunities for our undergraduates is a major point of pride for our college, and with good reason. The research experience offers young people numerous opportunities for personal and professional growth. And cultivating their interest in research is an essential part of building the pipeline we need to ensure that we continue to have enough high-caliber scientists to address the grand challenges facing our planet.

First and foremost, such opportunities offer students hands-on experience in what research is really like, something that classes alone can't do. "It takes you in a sort of uncharted territory," says CALS biology senior Nithin Charlly, who's been conducting research in biomolecular chemistry. "You've been in a classroom setting for such a long time, and these research opportunities make you put yourself out there and apply your knowledge in the real world."

Second, research helps direct students in their career choices, especially if they're considering graduate school. Getting a flavor of what research is about is really important before they make that very big career decision. A number of our student researchers have gone on to do important graduate work that their undergraduate research helped them identify, and they later went on to become leaders in their field.

Opportunities abound at CALS for undergraduate researchers. One of the most noted is through the Research Experiences for Undergraduates (REU) program, funded by the National Science Foundation (NSF). If a researcher holds an NSF grant, NSF offers a \$4,000–\$5,000 supplement to support an undergraduate doing an independent study project associated with that grant.

Other forms of support include Hilldale Undergraduate/Faculty Research Fellowships, Holstrom Environmental Scholarships and Goldwater Scholarships. You can see the fruits of these and other research opportunities every year at the CALS

Undergraduate Research Symposium (this spring on April 22), in which students present posters or give podium talks on projects they have worked on for at least one year.

I serve as faculty mentor for a particularly valuable program on campus, the Undergraduate Research Scholars (URS) program. The program is offered only to freshmen and sophomores and emphasizes including students from historically underrepresented groups. Nithin Charlly, the student quoted above, not only participated in this program, he now serves as a URS Fellow, a position in which he mentors a group of URS underclassmen in their projects – an invaluable opportunity to develop leadership skills.

Indeed, CALS undergraduates shine in the URS program, and a number of them have risen to the URS Fellow position. Another URS Fellow is CALS biology senior Erik Sanson, who is conducting research on the bacteria responsible for Lyme disease in the lab of entomology professor Susan Paskewitz. He points to another key value of undergraduate research at CALS.

"CALS professors are willing to network with you and offer potential lab positions," Sanson says. "As an undergraduate, this is an extremely important opportunity to have."

The close personal relationships with undergraduates are really rewarding. Students who go to small liberal arts colleges often appreciate the close contact that they have with actual professors. Research experiences are a mechanism by which students at CALS can have such contact with professors even at a very large public university.

Student Spotlight: A freshman's first few months on campus

Many parents dream of having their children follow in their footsteps. This fall for the first time we delivered our twins to college; one to the University of North Dakota and one to our alma mater, the beloved University of Wisconsin – Madison.

As we moved our daughter into the lakeshore dorms, so many memories flooded back. We were right back, 20-some years earlier. The dorm rooms look essentially the same as when we lived there; the same heavy doors and traditional keys, the same type of furniture, the same long hallway of doors. The biggest change is the telephone, with the cord that could reach the hallway, is no longer attached to the wall, though I swear I could still see the outline.

Looking out the window, we could see the courtyard and lakeshore path. How many times had we walked that path all the way to Memorial Union and skirted through the fences to make our way to Langdon? And looking the other way towards Animal Science and the dairy barns – all looked right and familiar. We were home.

But as we walked around campus there were also a lot of differences. Dejope Hall is the huge, modern residence hall that fills the open field between the dorms and the Nat. Other new buildings have sprouted everywhere, especially along University Avenue. A few familiar places still stand: State Street Brats, The Red Shed, Church Key. All hold a special place in our memories. And will now be part of our daughter's experience.

Now that a few months have passed, I took off my "Mom hat" and asked her about her experience and what she has learned about the college and herself during these last few months. Here is what she said:

Now that I'm a little more comfortable, I love being on

my own and able to go my own way. Coming from a small town and small school in rural Wisconsin, I was a little concerned about how big the campus was. I had never navigated a bus system or been on my own in a large city. It was all new and a bit intimidating. I told myself I just needed to jump in and try things. So far, I've only ended up on the wrong side of town once.

Living in the dorms has been good for acclimating to college life. Since my dorm floor is all freshmen, we're all in the same boat. We can really talk and support each other.

Coming from a small high school, the lectures are a lot different. You don't always get the same hands-on, one-on-one attention you had in high school. I've really tried to find someone I know in each class to make it more of a personal environment.

Studying is also so different in college. In high school, I never had to crack a book. In college, that just won't fly. You have to study for your college courses. You have to take the initiative to seek out help and you have to be proactive. I don't want to say that the professors don't care, but you have to make your own way in college.

The other advice I would give is get involved. I'm currently joining several student organizations; AWA, Saddle & Sirloin, Student Emergency Medical Services and Badger Dairy Club. I've already made some good friends and started to feel more a part of the community.

Truly, I think the biggest thing I've learned is just trust in yourself and get out there. That's true for everything.

So it seems that, though some things have changed over the last two decades at the University of Wisconsin – Madison, many things have stayed the same. We are thankful that the College of Ag seems to be the same welcoming place that we remember and that our first college student is in good hands!
