

Stopping the Next Pandemic: We Need a 'Space Race' Against Viruses

After more than a year of struggling against COVID-19, vaccines have been developed and deployed in record time, and we are starting to see a rational path out of the pandemic. As momentous as this is, the truth is that COVID-19 is only one battle in an expanding, long-term war between humanity and viruses. We must make good use of the approaching momentary pause to prepare for the next onslaught.

The accelerating emergence of deadly viruses has become an increasingly urgent problem for mankind as we push deeper into the natural habitat of animals that are the primary source of such outbreaks. In the century since the influenza pandemic of 1918, the pace of virus emergence and spread has progressively quickened. Beginning in the 1980s, we were hit by the global HIV/AIDS pandemic. The SARS coronavirus respiratory syndrome emerged in Asia in 2003 and, nine years later, MERS appeared in the Middle East. International outbreaks of the Ebola and Zika viruses made terrifying headlines during the past decade.

Confident predictions by epidemiologists and virologists that such emerging viruses would lead to deadly pandemics were dramatically realized with COVID-19 — and prospects for future pandemics are only increasing.

Timely action now should help to greatly cushion the impact of, or perhaps to prevent, the next pandemic. Such action includes allocating appropriate resources to priorities such as funding much-needed advances in critical basic research areas and expanding public health infrastructure.

The terrible toll in lives and money that COVID-19 inflicted underscores the importance of acting to protect our future. The United States alone, with 4 percent of the world's population, suffered 20 percent of COVID-19 deaths — now well over a staggering half-million people — comparable to the total number of Americans killed in World War II and the Vietnam and Korean wars combined. The devastating hit to the U.S. economy was estimated to reach \$16 trillion. For comparison, U.S. military spending on the "war on terror" in Iraq and Afghanistan over the past 20 years was approximately \$6.4 trillion.

Given the massive damage caused by COVID-19, the amount that we spend on combating viruses is extremely modest, especially compared to other government outlays. The United States spends at least \$700 billion a year on defense, more than our rivals China and Russia and our friends the

United Kingdom and Germany combined. Although vital for many aspects of our national security, that spending is not intended to and did not protect us from COVID-19. The National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases, led by Dr. Anthony Fauci, the primary funder of U.S. viral, bacterial, general microbiology, and immunology research, has a budget under \$6 billion — less than 1 percent of core defense spending.

Further investments in relevant basic research, medicine and public health are critically needed and could provide gamechanging advances in pandemic protections.

Fortunately, critical breakthroughs in understanding and controlling viruses are within our grasp, and investment in these areas will bring handsome rewards. Recent tremendous progress in general virology and understanding of the MERS and SARS viruses, for example, gave us a valuable running start in combating COVID-19.

Among other benefits, research will crucially extend recent discoveries on how viruses replicate and attack their hosts. One exciting outcome of such work is the growing revelation of similar features shared across multiple viruses, or even virus classes, including shared dependence on common host cell pathways. Similar to the way that many antibiotics work against multiple kinds of bacteria, these shared features can serve as targets for developing vaccines and antiviral drugs that inhibit not just one but a whole group of viruses, which would be a major step forward. For lack of such abilities, the world went into lockdown while scientists and doctors struggled mightily to generate, validate, and deliver specific vaccines against COVID-19.

Developing a growing toolbox of broad-spectrum antivirals would much better position us to deal with emerging viruses, providing a good chance that some broad-spectrum agents could work against a new virus threat, individually and likely more powerfully in combination. Generating such broad-use antiviral tools is particularly important since we cannot predict what type of virus will cause the next pandemic. Indeed, the most dangerous pathogenic viruses that emerged in the past century — influenza virus, HIV, coronaviruses, etc. — were all from very different virus families previously considered largely innocuous to humans.

Providing a response commensurate with the scale of emerging viral dangers will take concerted, collaborative efforts similar to the "space race" of the 1960s.

Meet Reba Bergmann

What brought you to your current career?

I wasn't the student who had a job lined up after graduation. I was the student who at the time was willing take whatever full-time job she could get to start with. After a few years of bouncing around the jobs, I thought I had to work in because of what my major was. Eventually, I found myself working registration at a health care facility part-time. I realized I enjoyed being involved in healthcare. I never saw myself as a doctor or nurse, but working in healthcare in an administrative role is where I have truly been able to enjoy my work.

It's rewarding to see CALS grads being sought after and utilizing their degree and skills outside of their major. How have you adapted to your career area and how did your CALS degree support you or help you navigate the change? Not getting a career directly related to my degree field was one of the most challenging aspects of realizing I wanted to work in healthcare. I initially thought my college education would be wasted. But even though I'm not using some of the niche aspects from my degree, I am still using the core concepts. I still have been able to find value in my education, and use that to my advantage.

How did you come to be involved with WALSAA? I always admired the people who dedicated some of their time and talents to WALSAA when I was in college, but I didn't eventually see myself becoming one of them.

For me, I joined WALSAA simply because I wanted to attend the WALSAA Football Fire-up and knew a lot of people who were also involved in the organization. Although I had joined, I didn't think I would become really involved, because as my career shifted, so did the people I typically interacted with. Having remained in contact with some of those who are more involved than I am, I was asked if I wanted to be more involved and jumped at the opportunity. For me there was some personal concern about if I was suited to help, as I no longer had a pulse on the agriculture industry, but I have found that I am able to help in ways that I would have never thought of before.

What was the biggest influence UW-Madison and/or WALSAA had on you?

The biggest influence of my time at UW and involvement with WALSAA has been the connections I have made. I know that sounds cliché, but that truly is the answer. The people I have met and been able to interact with have helped me in ways I am still coming to understand.

What message would you give to current and potential members?

Just because your plans change, does not mean that what you have worked so hard for and who you have become don't count. I never thought of myself working in healthcare. My goal had always been to be working in the communications aspect of the agriculture industry. Now that I have accepted the change in where I see myself, I have become the best and happiest version of myself.

Similar to that effort, a "space race" against pandemics would embody ambitious goals to understand and control viruses, consistent financial support, innovative approaches, and public/private partnerships. We also would need to strengthen public health education and that infrastructure essential to deliver resulting vaccines and drugs to the public. Also like the original space race, such a program would provide many valuable spinoff benefits — in this case, to medicine, biotechnology and other areas. For example, the new mRNA vaccine technology being used to protect people from COVID-19 promises valuable applications to fight cancer and other diseases.

The COVID-19 pandemic is not an isolated event but one step in an accelerating progression of viral threats. While

overcoming COVID-19 must remain our immediate priority, we also must recognize this as a wake-up call to address some of the greatest continuing dangers to human health, the economy, and national security. The good news is that we can succeed if we are willing to support the crucial actions and investments needed to learn the strengths and weaknesses of our diverse viral adversaries and how to control them.

In addition to his CALS appointment, Paul Ahlquist is director of the John W. and Jeanne M. Rowe Center for Research in Virology at UW's Morgridge Institute for Research and professor in the Department of Oncology at the UW School of Medicine and Public Health. He served on the WALSAA Board for nine years and was president of the organization in 1997-98. Kaczmarek served the organization as the WALSAA treasurer during WALSAA's transition from Ag Hall to a self-sufficient organization. He maintained the relationships with Ag Hall and the UW Foundation ensuring all scholarships continued to be awarded as designated. Before his sudden health challenges, he worked behind the scenes to set up the WALSAA Scholarship Fund, a place where members and supporters could donate to continue to support the Outstanding Sophomore Awards. There are few that have done more for WALSAA's history, present and future. His work still secures WALSAA's foundation.

Kaczmarek graduated from UW-Madison with a bachelor's degree in construction administration, and received a master's degree in business administration from UW-Milwaukee.

"Badger Bob" not only volunteered with WALSAA, but he led the Kenosha area efforts for Wisconsin Alumni Association (WAA), sharing his pride for the UW in the southeast region. Most notably, he is known for all he gave to Badger Boy state. He was a counselor for many years, and enjoyed the opportunity to inspire, teach and lead young men in their civic responsibility and journey. He was a tireless volunteer and advocate for this program.

The WALSAA Daluge Red Jacket Award honors Rick and Peggy Daluge. Rick was WALSAA's **Executive Director** for many years and a founding member of the National Agricultural Alumni and Development Association (NAADA). Rick served as CALS **Placement Director** and CALS Assistant Dean before retiring

Northstar Bison in Cameron, Wisconsin were recognized with the 2021 Friend of Short Course Award. FISC students attended their farm during the Agriculture Experience Tour in November 2019. They provided bison burgers and an opportunity to hear from founders Lee and Mary Graese about how the farm and business started. Their daughter Marielle Hewitt shared how they raise and handle bison, answered students' questions, while they were able to pet Anna, a bottle-raised bison who is a matriarch of the herd, through the fence. This is unique because most bison avoid people, even ones who are known to them. Students continue to rate this farm visit their number one of the trip. Many indicate how informative it was and that they didn't even know bison farming was possible, or that there were bison in Wisconsin.

Originally from the Madison area, this year's recipient of the Service to Agriculture Award spent part of his youth on his uncle's farm in Western Iowa. He graduated from UW-Madison CALS in 1976 and began a broadcasting career in Madison with Larry Meiller on his radio show on public radio that was then a farm information program. In February of 1977 he arrived in Eau Claire to do radio and TV at WEAU-TV and WAXX radio. Over the years, he has been a national board member for the National Association of Farm Broadcasting and have served both the UW-Madison CALS Alumni Board and the UW-River Falls College of Agriculture, Food and Environmental Sciences Advisory Board. He has also received the Honorary Recognition award from CALS, been selected as the National Farm Broadcaster of the year in 2007, and was inducted into the Wisconsin Broadcasters Hall of Fame in 2008 and the NAFB Hall of Fame in 2016.
