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CALS MESSAGE

Stepping Down, Staying On

As I mentioned in my message in January, I am stepping down as dean of CALS this summer. This will be my last column for *WALSAA Express*. It's bittersweet to write those words, but I am happy to report that I leave the deanship in highly capable hands.

Our new dean, Glenda Gillaspy, begins her tenure in August. Glenda comes to us from Virginia Tech, where she has been a professor of biochemistry since 1998 and head of the department since 2015. She brings a track record of success in enhancing graduate education, attracting and retaining new faculty, and securing resources for teaching and research. I have been enjoying getting to know Glenda while I have been sharing information about CALS. You'll hear more from her in our fall issue.

This leadership transition comes at a time when CALS is well-positioned for success. As I highlighted in my column in the March issue, we just completed a fruitful comprehensive fundraising campaign. We are making great progress in developing new academic programs, and the early indications are that the surge in first-year enrollment at UW–Madison is translating into growth for CALS. Our research and outreach programs are strong and have been recently bolstered by new federal funding for initiatives that are tied to our strengths and priorities. Here are three examples:

First, the latest federal spending package includes \$39.7 million for the USDA Agricultural Research Service (USDA ARS) to build a new plant germplasm facility at our West Madison Agricultural Research Station. The facility will be used by plant scientists from UW and the USDA ARS Vegetable Crop Research Unit. It will bolster our Plant Breeding and Plant Genetics Program, which has been going strong for nearly 55 years.

Another example: CALS received \$10 million from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention for the Midwest Center

of Excellence for Vector-Borne Disease. This center is already making terrific progress on research into illnesses transmitted by ticks and mosquitoes. The influx of new funds will help CALS integrate vector-borne disease into instruction and training associated with the college's new global health major.

Yet another major project receiving a significant federal investment is the Dairy Business Innovation Alliance, a partnership between the Center for Dairy Research and the Wisconsin Cheesemakers Association that supports research and technical assistance for the dairy industry. The additional \$20 million will expand the program's reach from five midwestern states to 10.

I could go on with many more stories about the terrific momentum in CALS. It's clear that our new dean will have exciting projects to champion, changes to guide, and newly recruited faculty, staff, and students to welcome.

With the stage set for a prosperous future for CALS, I am pleased to say I will be remaining with the college to pursue some special projects before retirement. For example, I'll be contributing to curriculum planning in the departments of agronomy and horticulture and also scoping out possibilities for the college's non-credit instruction portfolio. I also hope to learn more about how to communicate effectively with the public about the plant sciences. I expect there will be more, but not enough to impinge on volunteering in Allen Centennial Gardens and time with friends and family.

I am extraordinarily grateful for the experiences of the past decade. I am proud of all that CALS and its community have accomplished. And I am most appreciative of the many relationships formed with colleagues, alumni, and friends over the years. I am looking forward to even more opportunities to cross paths.

MEMBER SPOTLIGHT

Meet Dr. Michelle Brenner



Dr. Michelle Brenner - Biochemistry and Spanish, 2010 Starting July 2022, Pediatric Hematology/Oncology Fellow at the Medical College of Wisconsin/Children's Hospital of Wisconsin in Milwaukee, WI

What brought you to your current career?

My path to medicine was not a straight-forward one. I majored in Biochemistry and Spanish knowing that I wanted to go to medical school. I did try right out of undergraduate and did not get any interviews. During my time at UW-Madison, I was in the Biochemistry lab of Dr. Elizabeth Craig and loved doing research. So, when plan A did not work, I went to plan B and got a job as research technologist at the Blood Center of Wisconsin's Blood Research Institute. In my role, I did basic science and clinical science work in platelet signaling and activation with Dr. Debra Newman. While working, I also received a Master's Degree in Clinical and Translational Science from the Medical College of Wisconsin. I had the opportunity to go on several medical mission trips to Sumpango, Guatemala utilizing my Spanish-speaking skills and exploring my love of medicine. After working for five years, I still had the desire to go to medical school and was accepted to Des Moines University College of Osteopathic Medicine. While there, I discovered my love of pediatrics and returned to the University of Wisconsin-Madison's Pediatric Residency program. Throughout my training, I continued to love taking care of pediatric hematology/oncology patients and decided that I wanted to specialize in the care of these amazing patients.

It's rewarding to see CALS grads being sought after and utilizing their degree and skills outside of their major. How have you adapted to your career area and how did your CALS degree support you or help you navigate the change?

What I really loved about my degree through CALS was that I was able to focus on the science of Biochemistry and get all the prerequisites I needed for medical school, but also learn valuable skills outside of those core classes through my second major in Spanish and other requirements. As such, these additional classes helped me when I had to seek other opportunities and in medical training as well. For example, I was able to find a really great research technologist position because I had completed the honors degree distinction through my research work. When I started working, I already had some great skills in research and research communication.

How did you come to be involved with WALSAA?

I first became aware of WALSAA as an at-large representative for the CALS student council. The CALS student council was a great way to meet a lot of different people, but also make a large University feel like a smaller community. WALSAA helped to sponsor student council activities and provide much needed and appreciated scholarships to students (of which I was a recipient of) In my sophomore year, I then became a CALS Ambassador and the WALSAA student representative. As the WALSAA student representative I helped get volunteers for the football fire-up, wrote a column about student activities and achievements, hosted the first ever alumni-student dinner networking opportunity, and continued to be the connection between WALSAA and the CALS student council.

What was the biggest influence UW-Madison and/or WALSAA had on you?

UW-Madison and WALSAA gave me the opportunities to practice and develop my leadership skills, which have been vital in my career development. I am more confident speaking in front of groups or at team meetings, because I got to practice as the WALSAA student representative. I know how to work well in group situations, because I had the opportunity to work with student and alumni from various backgrounds and with various experiences and still achieve a common goal.

What message would you give to current and potential members?

Thank you for your support through time and/or money of CALS students! As a student at a huge University, CALS and WALSAA were a home to me and definitely played a role in the success I have found (no matter how circuitous the road was). In addition, the scholarships that WALSAA provides are appreciated and valued by each student. I am so happy to give back to future CALS students by being a lifetime WALSAA member and participating in fundraisers when able. Thank you! 

Jennifer has done an exemplary job of ensuring that each student's unique background is considered. From those who grow crops to those from dairy operations, every student is able to take something from the classes back to their home operation. As a passionate educator and mentor to many, she exemplifies excellence in teaching.

Eric has had a tremendous impact on both the Farm and Industry Short Course and the Department of Animal and Dairy Sciences.

Eryne Jenkins • Biology and Environmental Studies

Eryne Jenkins of Magnolia, Delaware, is graduating from the UW with degrees in biology and environmental studies. The experience of growing up in a rural community, with limited health care, is leading her to pursue a career in medicine as a community health physician and educator with emphasis on improving women's health and well-being.

Jenkins has been an exceptional campus and community leader. She has continually sought to understand how communities play a role in health. As a Fellow in the Clinton Foundation's Clinton Global Initiative University, she

founded "P+: Safely Making the Grade for Period Positivity", allowing her to educate young girls on the negative effects of synthetic menstrual products and the positive advantages of reusable products or organic disposal options. She has received funding to implement this program in the Madison Metropolitan School District. Jenkins was an intern with the Foundation for Black Women's Wellness and an Interfaith Fellow at the UW Center for Religion and Global Citizenry where she studied how religious adversity affects health. She participated in a UW study abroad program in Denmark. Jenkins is the chapter president of Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority and an undergraduate teaching Fellow in CALS's QuickStart Connect2Campus program. She has volunteered at the American Red Cross and UW Center for Patient Partnerships, been a tutor for local at-risk youth, and an undergraduate researcher at a perinatal research lab. Jenkins was appointed a student representative on the UW's Ethnic Studies Academic Committee and the Committee on Undergraduate Recruitment, Admissions and Financial Aid where she strove to ensure diversity, inclusion and accessibility for all. In 2020, she was nominated by CALS as a panelist on the Campus Diversity Forum. Jenkins is a member of the Wisconsin International Scholars Program and has received the On Wisconsin Society Award for Leadership and Academic Excellence and the Arthur B. Sacks Award for Undergraduate Excellence in Environmental Studies.

Jenkins is appreciative of the opportunities and experiences she has had as a "Badger". She remains motivated and dedicated to "give back" to others in the future. As she thoughtfully states, "The knowledge I have gained through my education is only worth the impact I can create on the world with that knowledge."



Jordan Main • Biological Systems Engineering

Jordan Main is from New Berlin, Wisconsin, and graduating with a degree in biological systems engineering, along with certificates in environmental studies and religious studies. "At the core of what motivates me is an affinity for 'patterns'," states Main, who says she was drawn to her field of study because of the "patterns that exist at the intersections of society and the environment". Main plans to attend graduate school and eventually take the knowledge she has gained to challenge these "patterns" by developing tools and solutions that can help solve the world's environmental problems due

to our changing climate and the growing global population. "Specifically," she says, "my hope is to work on the issues of resource scarcity that are inevitable in the next century."

Main was part of CALS's inaugural QuickStart program cohort in 2018 and has remained vitally involved in this program ever since. She has been a peer mentor, an Ambassador and integral part of CALS's teaching team for both QuickStart and Inter-Ag 155 as a lead teaching assistant, impacting over 400 first-year students, as well as many undergraduate fellows and professional staff in this role. She has played a direct part in researching and developing curriculum for QuickStart and analyzing feedback over multiple years.

Main has valued CALS's interdisciplinary approach that brings different fields of study together. She was the team leader of a senior engineering design project that designed and constructed a small scale hydroponic system for vegetable production at the Leopold Greenhouse. Throughout college, she has been involved in undergraduate research labs that have bridged engineering, agriculture and environmental sciences. In one lab, she took on a weather station implementation project of her own to develop an accessible, low-cost system for farmers that can sense temperature, humidity, wind speed and direction, and rain depth. Main has been president and secretary of the UW's American Society of Agricultural & Biological Engineers student chapter and an event coordinator for the Sigma Alpha Sorority. She was previously a member of the Association of Women in Agriculture (AWA). Main has additionally been co-director of The Artisan Collective, a student organization dedicated to selling fair-trade jewelry made by global women artisans to increase their economic security.



Tanner Oyen • Agronomy

Tanner Oyen is from Lancaster, Wisconsin. A first generation college student from a farm family, he has used his drive and enthusiasm for learning to graduate with a degree in agronomy and a certificate in business management in only three years at the UW, all while maintaining a 3.9 GPA and being on the Dean's List every semester.

On campus, Oyen joined as many clubs and organizations as possible and said "yes" to every opportunity. "It was one of the best decisions I ever made," he says. Oyen has been president of the Badger Crops Club, co-founder and

vice-president of the Forex Investment Club, captain of the UW Quarter-Scale Tractor Pulling Team, captain of the Crop Judging Team, and an active member of Alpha Gamma Rho (AGR). He has also been a CALS Ambassador. Throughout his course work, he has continually stepped up without prompting to volunteer and be a mentor and tutor to fellow students in need of help. During his time at the UW, Oyen has been selected a Renk Agribusiness Scholar, National Association of Plant Breeding - Borlaug Scholar, and a Mid America CropLife Association Young Leader Scholar, the latter leading to involvement in CropLife's Ambassador Network program. Oyen spent more than two years as a lab research assistant at the UW's Cereals Breeding & Quantitative Genetics Lab and after the first year was able to lead his own funded research project on oat panicle architecture and its relationship to seed production. This dedication led him to be selected a Hillsdale Sophomore Research Fellow. Oyen has additionally completed three internships in the crop protection and production industry, two of these with Helena Agri-Enterprises in Illinois where he was named their Midwest Division Intern of the Year twice and upon graduation will be joining their team as a sales agronomist.

Oyen's educational journey is not over. He says, "I look forward to using the knowledge, soft skills and experiences I've collect to one day pursue a Master's degree in agronomy. I do not know exactly how I will be using that advanced degree, but I do know that if I want to be the best at what I do, further education will never hinder that."
