Continuing with its newest tradition, the Wisconsin Agricultural and Life Sciences Alumni Association (WALSAA) will present the eighth WALSAA Daluge Red Jacket Award at their Football Fire-Up event on September 7. "WALSAA is proud to present our highest award, the Red Jacket Award, to Pierce Dopp. Pierce has been a longtime supporter of WALSAA both on the Board of Directors and through individual donations. He epitomizes the ideal alumni," shares WALSAA President John Brunnquell.

Dopp was named this year's recipient because of his dedication and service to WALSAA for many years. He has served on the WALSAA Board for the past six years and was President of the organization from 2020-21. Since then, UW has announced two new projects funded by

WRPI, this time focused on responding to natural disasters and protecting water quality in rural Wisconsin. Each project fosters collaborations between interdisciplinary teams of university scientists, local non-profit organizations, elected officials, farmers, business owners, and other neighbor groups. In short, they exemplify the Wisconsin Idea.

In the Summer 2023 issue of WALSAA Connection, I

announced the launch of UW-Madison's Wisconsin Rural

Partnerships Institute (WRPI). This initiative is designed to

better meet the needs of rural communities by creating new partnerships and supporting community-based projects. It

was made possible through \$9.3 million in funding from the

One of these two new projects, led by Jed Colguhoun, professor and extension specialist in the Department of Plant and Agroecosystem Sciences, aims to improve groundwater quality in Wisconsin's Central Sands. This region in the middle of the state includes 2 million acres with deep sandy soil and a mostly rural population of around 300,000. Potatoes and processing vegetables grow particularly well in sandy soil, and these crops generate more than \$5.8 billion in total economic activity in the region.

However, the deep sandy soil is more susceptible than other soil types to groundwater leaching of nutrients and pesticides used to grow the crops, resulting in higher

concentrations of nitrate in groundwater than other parts of the state. The project includes field research to assess impacts from solutions that are both economically viable and

feasible for growers to adopt. The project team also plans to provide area communities with research-based

information on improving and protecting water quality.

WRPI is part of a broader USDA-funded Institute for Rural Partnerships, housed at UW–Madison, Auburn University, and the University of Vermont. The institute aims to promote equitable, resilient, and prosperous food and agricultural systems and expanded opportunities for rural community development. It fosters collaborations with community-based initiatives and local research, educational institutions, and subject matter experts. Learn more at ruralpartners.wisc.edu.



but also his involvement in World Dairy Expo. The farm is currently passing the torch to Bryan's son, Christopher, who is also a very gifted farmer and breeder. We have sold and shipped live animals, embryos, and semen from

our high-quality herd to other breeders all over the world.

**Tell us something about The Jimmys that we don't know.** Well, we are not only sponsored by Hammond Organ Co., but also by Jose Cuervo Tequila, and New Glarus Brewery. How's that for a combination!

#### What is your most memorable musical performance?

There are ever so many, however I think one my most notable memories was being able to play and record with Louisiana blues star, Long Tall Marcia Ball. She's been my piano hero for 30 plus years, and to be able to write, record, and perform our original music together is beyond words! Perhaps

a notable memory for the band as a whole, was playing the prestigious Sighisoara Blues Festival in Romania, and ultimately recording our highly acclaimed live album, "Live From Transylvania!"

#### What do you foresee for the band in the future? Oh man...perhaps most simply, continue to tour and record our music..and maybe one day return to where it all started, the Alpha Gamma Rho living room!

#### Tell us about The Jimmys.

The Jimmys are a musical gumbo of Chicago Style Blues, Memphis Soul, and New Orleans R&B; heavily influenced by artists such as Ray Charles, Albert Collins, Otis Spann, The Band, Little Feat, and a plethora of others! Over the past 15 years, we have released six albums worth of butt-rocking original music. The band is comprised of a four-piece rhythm section, and a three-piece horn section: Jimmy Voegeli (Organ, Piano, Vocals), Perry Weber (Guitar, Vocals), Chris Sandoval (Drums), Johnny Wartenweiler (Bass), Pete Ross (Saxophone), Chad Whittinghill (Trumpet), and Joe Goltz (Trombone, Vocals). We have earned the respect of our peers all over the world as a very exciting and heavy musical act. We have toured to all over the US, Europe and Canada, as well as an annual Caribbean retreat with all of our fans!

### **The Wilson Connection to WALSAA**

The Wilson family has generously donated a one-week stay at their beautiful place in Door County to the WALSAA Football Fire-Up Silent Auction for the past 30 years. This story hangs on the well at Manney Place for guests to enjoy. Thank you to the Wilson family for your continued support of CALS student scholarships!

WALSAA (Wisconsin Agricultural and Life Sciences Alumni Association) is a charitable organization that supports the University of Wisconsin-Madison College of Agricultural and Life Sciences with thousands of dollars in scholarships and funds for student organizations. Established in 1972, the first WALSAA president said, "As alumni, we can act more effectively than any single group to rebuild the image of greatness that this college so justly deserves and at the same time enjoy the fellowship of working together."

James F. (Jim) Wilson, Jr.'s college career at the University of Wisconsin began in the fall of 1934. His father, James F. Wilson had been killed in a car accident just north of Sturgeon Bay in 1933. This left his wife, Rose Manney Wilson, to manage the Wilson General Store in Egg Harbor in the middle of the Great Depression.

As a high school student, Jim had little interest in the scholastic part of school, with correspondingly poor study habits and poor grades. But, at the insistence of his agriculture teacher, Merrill Ross, and in direct opposition to his high school principal, he applied to and was accepted at the UW-Madison College of Agricultural and Life Sciences. His mother, Rose, shut down the General Store and joined him in Madison where she became a housemother for a group of Door County students, including her son. She performed this task for four years and it has been said, "became quite an educated person."

Jim was helped with tuition costs by a \$500 per year contribution from his Uncle Chester Manney, Rose's brother. This was during a time that Uncle Chester had a Ford car dealership in Shanghai, China. To the surprise of many, Jim graduated in 1938 with a teaching degree in agriculture. He began his career as the Agricultural Education Instructor for Crivitz, Wisconsin High School.

Jim and Helen were avid members of WALSAA, always participating in the fall Fire-Up. This enabled them to reconnect with college and agriculture friends and their families. The Wilson Family includes four of Jim and Helen's children who graduated from CALS, and a son-in-law and numerous grandchildren who also graduated from UW-Madison. In memory of their parents and their commitment to the University of Wisconsin, the family has donated a week at their family home in Door County to the silent auction at the WALSAA Football Fire-Up. Over the many years this week has been offered, the family has raised over \$30,000 in scholarship support for WALSAA.
