Alumni Can Play a Role in CALS Recruitment

The largest incoming undergraduate class in history of 4,169 is the result of a concerted effort by CALS staff and faculty to provide more connections with prospective students. Through virtual and in-person meetings, the College increased efforts to reach seeking college-age students about the value of a CALS major and attending the UW–Madison. To build on this growth, there are ways alumni can join the effort.

• In-person and virtual visits to the CALS campus happen year-round. The general UW-Madison campus tour doesn't cover the west side of campus, so encouraging students interested in agricultural and life sciences to sign-up for a CALS session helps them see more of the



classrooms and campus they'll experience. Check out the website, VisitBucky.wisc.edu, for a list of sessions. Talk with local teachers and administrators to encourage them to attend the sessions or invite CALS recruitment staff to visit with your school.

- CALS attends the state and national conferences of 4-H and FFA to recruit prospective students. The College also sponsored and attended the Wisconsin Association of Agricultural Educators conference. Share your CALS experience with your school's agriculture educator, 4-H club, or talk with your local FFA.
- CALS hosted the state regional conference of the Health Occupation Student Association (HOSA) which brought 500 prospective high school students to Union South for faculty-led sessions and campus tours. Life Sciences majors now comprise 70% of CALS students. If you know of someone interested in a health-focused major, talk about the research-based, hands-on learning they'll receive in CALS.
- The Wisconsin Rural Scholars program, partially funded by USDA, brought rising high school seniors and their teachers to campus for a summer pre-college experience. This four-day residential program highlighted CALS academic programs, cutting-edge research, and the undergraduate student experience. Help grow this program through a donation to the University of Wisconsin Foundation for WI Rural Scholars.

CALS enrollment has momentum. Alumni can keep it growing. If you know of prospective student, send their name and contact info to ambassadors@cals.wisc.edu. Staff will contact the student to let them know a CALS alum shared they were interested in the college search process.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Building for the Next 50 Years of WALSAA

A few years ago, WALSAA celebrated 50 years of organizational growth. It's a big responsibility to carry WALSAA for the next 50 years. Priorities of the college have changed, students have changed — 70% of students in CALS are enrolled in life sciences vs. 30% in agriculture, a switch from when I was in school — and the way we connect with alumni has changed.

Your WALSAA board is enthusiastic about listening to your ideas to strengthen WALSAA. My partners on the executive team include Brian Koch (vice-president — meat and animal science), John Brunnquell (treasurer – agronomy B.S., poultry science M.S.) and June Roush (past president — agricultural economics). We are extremely appreciative of June's work over the past year in leading WALSAA. She handled details that set us up for more challenges. I'm excited to work with this team of alumni with a passion for the college.

How do we ensure a stable financial future for WALSAA? How do we build the Life Sciences connection? With 50,000 living CALS alumni, how do we engage alumni? How can we further engage students?

We've built a strong board and committee structure to address these questions. You'll hear more about these initiatives in future newsletters.

Let's begin with the first question. It's our end-of-year annual campaign and you'll find information on how to make a

difference in this newsletter. Think about how CALS impacted your life and how you might change another.

During my high school senior year, my sister — who worked at UW Financial Aid — called home to tell me a Financial Aid counselor reviewed my file. My status was poverty level which meant I would receive loans and grants to attend the UW. Alumni who provided scholarships, my work-study job, and financial aid allowed me to graduate from the UW. Somewhere in CALS, there's a student like me. That's why I give back to WALSAA and CALS.

Students at CALS apply for the FASFA, the federal financial aid form, at a 7% greater rate than the rest of the university. More than 31% of CALS students are eligible for a PEL grant, the federal program for undergraduate students based on exceptional financial need. Overall, the university rate is 26.5%. This means many CALS students are first generation students of low economic status.

Student life may be different now, but the need still exists. Please join me in giving back this holiday season by donating to WALSAA's annual campaign.

From Cows to Crew: Bill & Jean Ehrke's Passion for Education, Badger Sports & Community

Bill and Jean Ehrke have a long history of giving back starting with their time on campus. Their passion for education, sports, and leadership development inspired their dedication and commitment.

It began when Bill grew up near Fort Atkinson where he and his brothers milked cows, cleaned the barn, and made it on the school bus at 7 a.m. In high school, he was encouraged by his county extension agent and agriculture teacher — both Wisconsin grads — to attend the UW. His teacher helped him apply for

a scholarship, and Bill was awarded \$100/semester, which covered his tuition as he pursued a degree in dairy science.

As a student, Bill decided to join the Badger football team. "At that time, anyone could walk on. I foolishly thought I was good enough and big enough to play football. I cracked my ribs. As a student, if you weren't in a sport, you had to take physical education. We were doing an endurance run for class when Norm Sonju, the UW crew coach, saw me and asked me to join the team. I rowed for four years."

There weren't any D1 scholarships, so Bill rowed for the love of the sport. Competitions took place on the East or West Coast or in Florida. The team rode trains to the Intercollegiate Rowing Regatta (IRA) to row against schools like Navy and Yale.

"In 1957 at the IRA, we rowed on Onondaga Lake in Syracuse, New York. It was 105 degrees and the air smelled like rotten eggs due to a nearby solvay plant. We persevered. I rowed in the 3-seat winning the 2-mile race."

Classes and clubs kept Bill connected to his agricultural roots. He joined the Saddle & Sirloin Club and participated in the Little International where he won the Dairy Fitting & Showing Contest. He was on the dairy judging team and judged at the International Show in Chicago and Waterloo Dairy Show. He was the first out of his family's ten children to attend a 4-year college, graduating in 1959.

After college, Bill served in the Marine Core Reserve. When he returned, he worked for Dane County Dairy Improvement as manager while Jean finished her degree in home economics education at the UW.

After obtaining her master's degree in clothing and textiles from the UW, Jean taught for 30 years at Fort Atkinson High School. She belonged to the county and local homemakers organizations and the American Association of University Women.

Bill and Jean have given back to their college, their state, and their community in so many ways. In their free time — while raising their children Cheryl and Scott — Bill and Jean inspired others with their love of education. As president and scholarship chairman of the Fort Atkinson UW Alumni Association, Bill helped raise funds for student scholarships.

"As scholarship chair, it gave me insight into the scholarships needed for rural students. That's why we give to WALSAA."

Numerous times, the Ehrkes have donated to WALSAA's silent auction at Fire-Up.

Bill and Jean's passion for the Badgers spans generations. They've been Badger football season ticket holders for 58 years, for a while holding 10 season tickets. Bill has only missed seven home games. Bill, his daughter, and granddaughter attend every home game.

"This will be the 30th year that our Christmas card has a picture of everyone in Badger Red. It started when our first grandchildren, Cierra and Clayton, were born in 1995. Initially, Jean sewed all the grandchildren matching red outfits. This year, our great grandson will join the tradition."

Bill and Jean's love of the UW and history of philanthropy touches WALSAA student scholarship recipients, Badger athletes, fellow dairy and beef producers, and families and youth in their community. It keeps them young at heart and often in Badger Red clothing, a model we can all follow.
